



## Regulations for the Jean-Julliard Prize

1. The Jean Julliard Prize was established in 1962 in memory of the Society's first Secretary-General. The value of the Prize is \$5,000 U.S. The Prize winner will be presented with a certificate stating his or her name and the title of the scientific contribution(s). The Prize will be awarded during the meeting in each year in which an International Congress is held.
2. The Prize is reserved for scientists under 40 years of age at the time of submission of their manuscripts, in recognition of recently completed scientific work on blood transfusion and related subjects. In general, the Prize will be awarded to one individual, in special cases, the Prize may be shared by more than one individual.
3. The procedure to present a candidature shall be the following:
  - a) Forward six (6) copies of his or her submission to the Secretary-General, including a curriculum vitae.
  - b) All contributions must be written in English and should contain recent, original information.
  - c) Several papers published within the last three years may be submitted if they are related to similar scientific issues. If this approach is taken, the candidate must include a typewritten introduction to demonstrate how the papers relate to each other; he or she must also choose a single title for his or her submission.
  - d) If a manuscript is submitted, it must be typewritten, double spaced on one side of normal weight and normal size paper. Tables and illustrations should be inserted as separate pages close to where they are referred to in the text. With this exception, the format should follow that used in Vox Sanguinis.
    - All submissions shall be bound. The outside front cover must carry the title of the submission and the name and institutional address of the candidate. The above information shall be repeated on the first or title page of the submission.
    - A Table of Contents must follow the title page.
    - Following the Table of Contents should be the curriculum vitae of the candidate, which must include his or her birth date.
    - The curriculum vitae is to be followed by a short overall description of the aims of the work, the results and the conclusions drawn.
    - This statement shall be followed by a declaration of the proportion of the practical and intellectual content of the submission provided by the candidate.
    - When multi-authored papers are submitted, the Jean Julliard Committee will assume that the approval of the co-authors has been obtained for the inclusion of the joint work in the submission.
    - If animal or human experimentation is involved in any part of the study, a certificate that the study has received approval from local Ethics Committees must be included.
  - e) All papers must be submitted at least six (6) months prior to the date of the Award ceremony.

4. The procedure to award the Prize shall be as follow:
  - a) The submitted papers will be assessed by the Jean Julliard Committee elected by the Executive Committee and consisting of five members, plus two alternate members. The decision will be based upon a majority of votes.
  - b) Members of the Executive Committee, as well as members of the Jean Julliard Committee and their co-workers, cannot receive the Award.
  - c) All members of the Society will be notified at least one year in advance of when and where the next Jean Julliard Prize will be awarded. Details will also be published in Vox Sanguinis, the quarterly bulletin and submitted to other journals at least one year in advance.
  - d) The Secretary-General will inform the prize winner at least two months in advance of the Award ceremony and advise him or her that his or her presence at this ceremony is required.
  - e) If the winning submission is judged to be of sufficient merit, the winner will be required to give a Jean Julliard Lecture based upon his or her submission during the Congress at which the Prize is awarded.
  - f) If none of the submitted papers is considered to meet the requirements of the Jean Julliard Committee, the Jean Julliard Prize will not be awarded.
  - g) No Prize will be awarded if the Prize winner is not present at the Congress, unless proof acceptable to the Jean Julliard Committee has been offered, that his or her absence is justified.
